1. Sybil describes a recurring dream in which she cannot pick up her letter-writing tools as she begins to lose her sight. What does this reveal about her identity and fears early in the novel?
2. Sybil values traditional forms of communication like handwritten letters and print newspapers. What do these older methods offer that modern technology often does not?
3. Sybil prefers writing letters over phone calls so she can carefully compose her thoughts. How does this practice help her manage difficult relationships?
4. Sybil writes to people of different generations. How does her tone change depending on the recipient, and which version of her feels most authentic?
5. Sybil writes to authors such as Joan Didion and Ann Patchett. Which authors would you want to write to, and why?
6. Sybil summarizes decades of professional life in just a few sentences. What does this suggest about how we remember our own lives?
7. Did you have theories about who the unsent letters were meant for as you read?
8. Sybil finds herself in a love triangle. Between Theodore and Mick, who did you hope she would choose?
9. Were you surprised by Rosalie's relationship with Sybil's daughter? Did you see it as a betrayal?
10. How did learning the truth about Gilbert's death change your understanding of Sybil?
